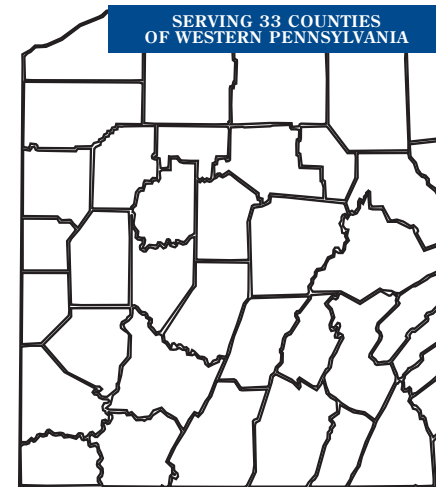

LABORER'S ANNUAL VETERANS CHRISTMAS VISIT



Attorney Talk . . . DOMENIC BELLISARIO, ESQ.

The financial crisis that hit us last year continues to have a devastating impact on many working families. These are very trying times. Many working families are strapped for cash. Many people are falling behind in their bills. For those who have been out of work due to an injury, the financial stress of trying to meet daily living expenses is particularly difficult. On top of trying to keep food on the table and the lights on, many working people dread hearing the phone ring. Is it a debt collector calling again?

I would like to take this opportunity to answer some frequently asked questions about debt collection.

- **Can a debt collector contact me any time or any place?** No. A debt collector may not contact you at inconvenient times or places, such as before 8:00 in the morning or after 9:00 at night, unless you agree to it. And collectors may not contact you at work if they're told (orally or in writing) that you're not allowed to get calls there.
- **How can I stop a debt collector from contacting me?** If a collector contacts you about a debt, you may want to talk to them at least once to see if you can resolve the matter - even if you don't think you owe the debt, can't repay it immediately, or think that the collector is contacting you by mistake. If you decide after contacting the debt collector that you don't want the collector to contact you again, tell the collector - in writing - to stop contacting you. Here's how to do that. Make a copy of your letter. Send the original by certified mail, and pay for a "return receipt" so you'll be able to document what the collector received. Once the collector receives your letter, they may not contact you again, with two exceptions: a collector can contact you to tell you there will be no further contact or to let you know that they or the creditor intend to take a specific action, like filing a lawsuit. Sending such a letter to a debt collector you owe money to does not get rid of the debt, but it should stop the contact. The creditor or the debt collector still can sue you to collect the debt.
- **Can a debt collector contact anyone else about my debt?** If an attorney is representing you about the debt, the debt collector must contact the attorney, rather than you. If you don't have an attorney, a collector may contact other people - but only to find out your address, your home phone number, and where you work. Collectors usually are prohibited from contacting third parties more than once. Other than to obtain this location information about you, a debt collector generally is not permitted to discuss your debt with anyone other than you, your spouse, or your attorney.

- **What practices are off limits for debt collectors?** Debt collectors may not harass, oppress, or abuse you or any third parties they contact. For example, they may not use threats of violence or harm; publish a list of names of people who refuse to pay their debts (but they can give this information to the credit reporting companies); use obscene or profane language; or repeatedly use the phone to annoy someone. Debt collectors may not lie when they are trying to collect a not falsely claim that they are attorneys or government representatives; falsely claim that you have committed a crime; falsely represent that they operate or work for a credit reporting company; misrepresent the amount you owe; indicate that papers they send you are legal forms if they aren't; or indicate that papers they send to you aren't legal forms if they are. Debt collectors also are prohibited from saying that you will be arrested if you don't pay your debt; they'll seize, garnish, attach, or sell your property or wages unless they are permitted by law to take the action and intend to do so; or legal action will be taken against you, if doing so would be illegal or if they don't intend to take the action.
- **Do I have any recourse if I think a debt collector has violated the law?** You have the right to sue a collector in a state or federal court within one year from the date the law was violated. If you win, the judge can require the collector to pay you for any damages you can prove you suffered because of the illegal collection practices, like lost wages and medical bills. The judge can require the debt collector to pay you up to \$1,000, even if you can't prove that you suffered actual damages. You also can be reimbursed for your attorney's fees and court costs.

These are just some of your rights under federal law when it comes to debt collectors. If you find yourself confronted by debt collectors, it is always best to know your rights.

Keep in mind that if you are falling behind in your bills because of an injury or illness, you may be entitled to wage loss benefits under workers' compensation, an automobile policy, or social security disability. You might also have some credit card or mortgage insurance that would suspend your payments while you are disabled. It is always best to consult with a lawyer promptly when you become disabled to see what benefits are available to you before you fall too far behind with your payments.
